Bath, Maine Nan Kilbourn-Tara, a potter, threw majolica finials to cap the enclosure of her vegetable garden. Then she collaborated with her husband, architect Jozef Tara, on a backdrop for her perennial border. "I made a brushstroke on paper," she reports, "similar to the decoration on my pottery, and Joe translated it into wood segments I arranged on the fence. People read them as birds or mountaintops. I see them as abstract play."
